Introduction

The Livingston County Water & Sewer Authority (the Authority) is a public benefit corporation that was established in 1995 by an act of the State Legislature. As outlined in its enabling legislation, the Authority was created ***“for the benefit of the people of the county and the state, for the improvement of their health, welfare and prosperity, and that such purposes are public purposes, and that the authority is and will be performing an essential governmental function in the exercise of the powers conferred upon it”***.

The Authority’s primary responsibilities are to construct, improve, maintain, develop, expand and rehabilitate water and sewerage facilities. The Authority currently operates and maintains: two wastewater treatment plants, approximately 50 miles of sanitary sewer collection and conveyance piping, and 45 sewage pump stations; approximately 75 miles of water distribution and transmission piping, 12 water storage tanks, 7 booster pump stations, and 5 re-chlorination stations.

The Authority is providing water services to approximately 3,608 water accounts. The Authority’s water customers are located within the Village of Livonia and portions of the Towns of Avon, Caledonia, Conesus, Geneseo, Groveland, Livonia, and Sparta.

The Authority is providing sewer services to approximately 3,527 sewer accounts. The Authority’s sewer customers are located within the Village of Livonia and portions of the Towns of Livonia, Conesus, Avon, Groveland, Leicester, Mt. Morris, and Sparta.

The Authority is also responsible for the operation and maintenance of the flood gates in Conesus Creek at the outlet of Conesus Lake. This is accomplished through an agreement between the Authority and the Conesus Lake Compact (Towns of Conesus, Geneseo, Groveland, and Livonia).

Our Mission

To provide high quality, environmentally sound, efficient, reliable, and affordable water and sewer services to the people who live, work, and visit Livingston County.

Our Board

The Authority is governed by a Board consisting of seven members, who are residents of Livingston County and are appointed by resolution of the Board of Supervisors. These members are civic-minded individuals, with diverse backgrounds, who volunteer their time to the organization. Members are appointed to three-year terms.

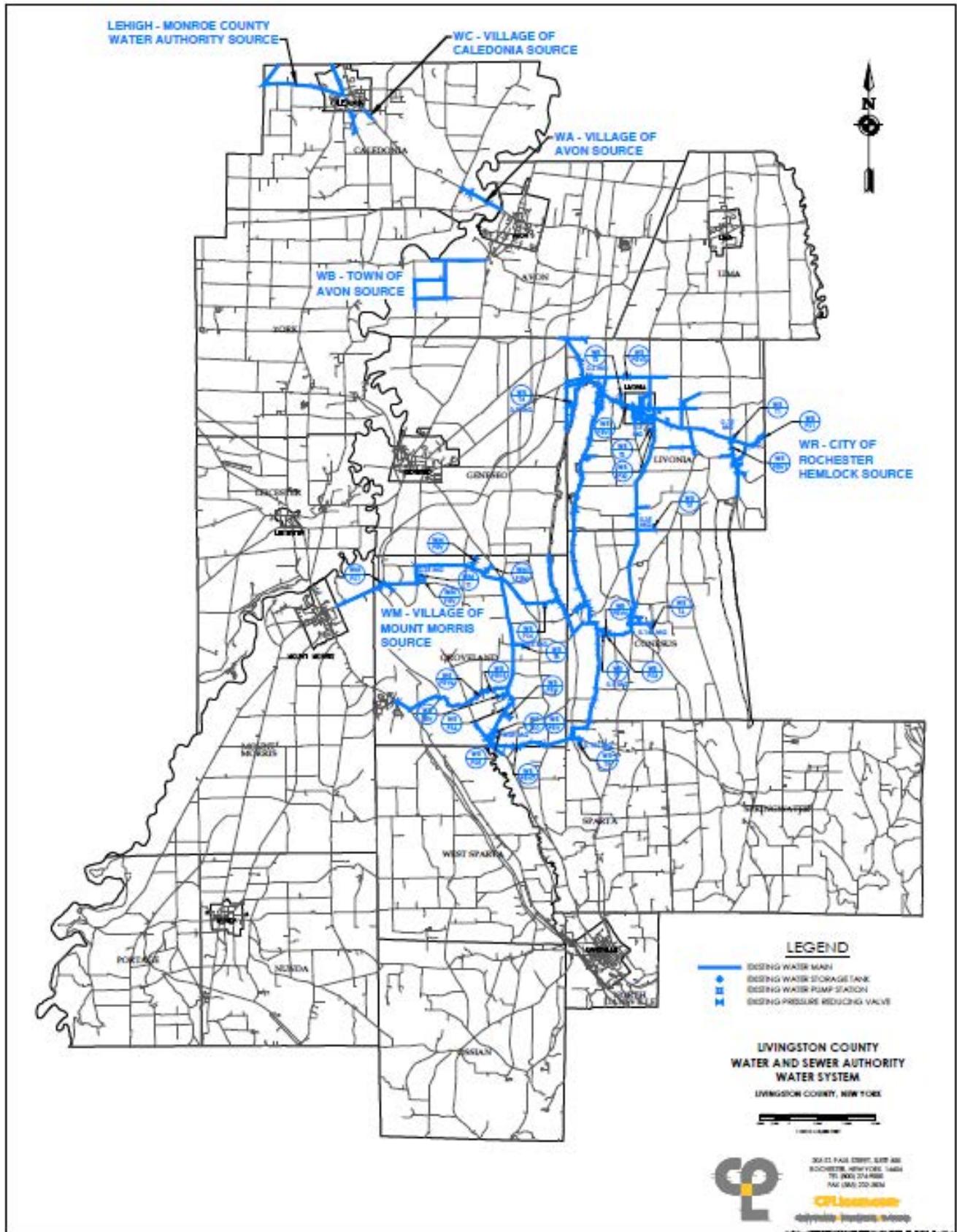
In accordance with Public Authorities Law, the Authority has established the required Governance and Audit and Finance Committees. As in previous years, the Board has elected to meet as a committee of the whole to discuss governance, audit, or finance related items.

Our Team

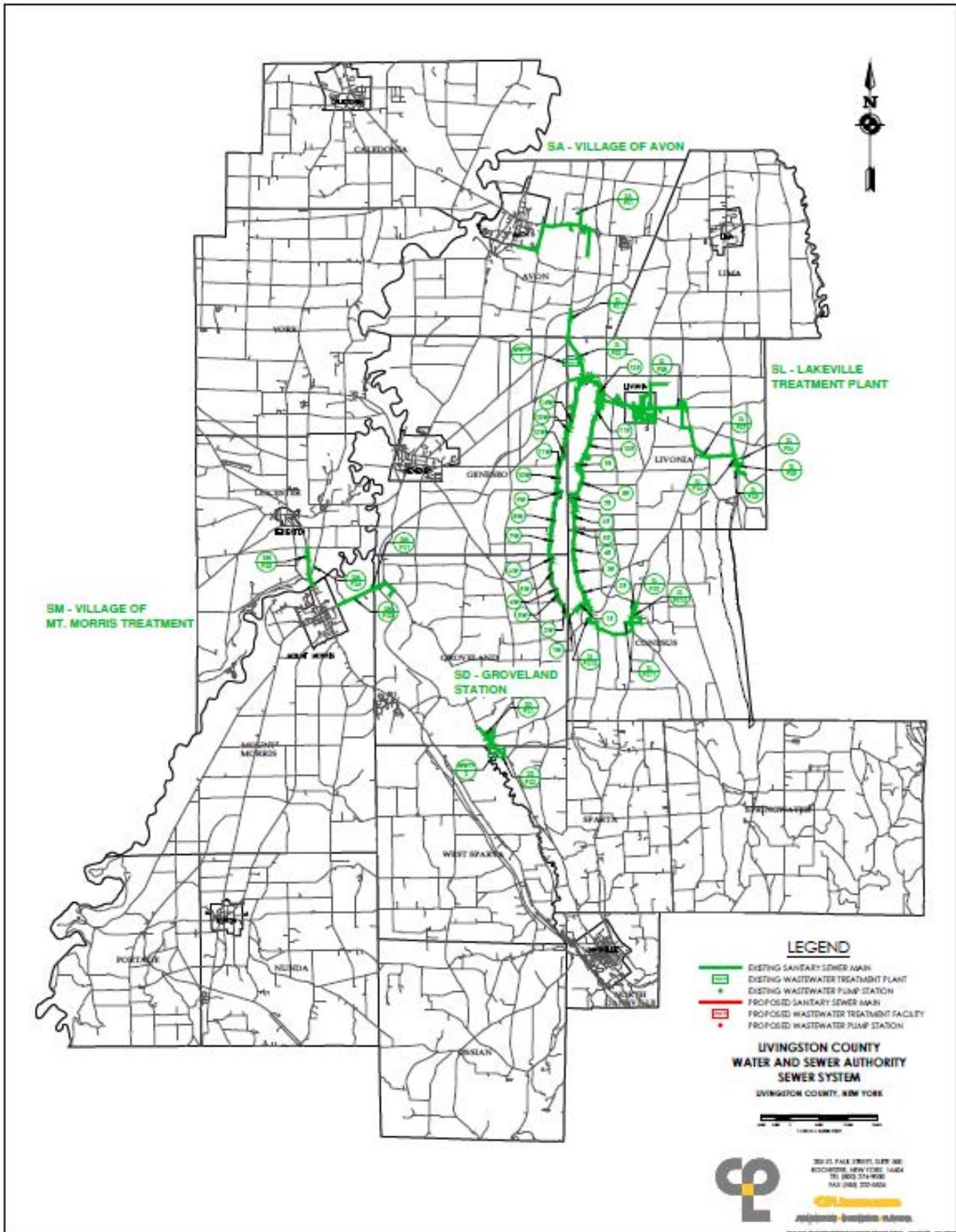
The Authority has an overall staff of 13 full-time employees, which includes: One (1) Executive Director (who is the Chief Executive Officer and Chief Fiscal Officer of the Authority), One (1) Director of Operations, One (1) Principal Account Clerk, Two (2) Senior Account Clerk/Typists, Five (5) Water/Wastewater Maintenance Persons, and One (1) Building Maintenance Person.

The Authority has One (1) Senior Wastewater Treatment Plant Operator, and One (1) Wastewater Treatment Plant Operator-Trainee that are responsible for the operation and maintenance of the Authority's two wastewater treatment plants, Lakeville Wastewater Treatment Plant (SPDES NY 0032328), and Groveland Station Sewage Treatment Plant (SPDES NY 0247227).

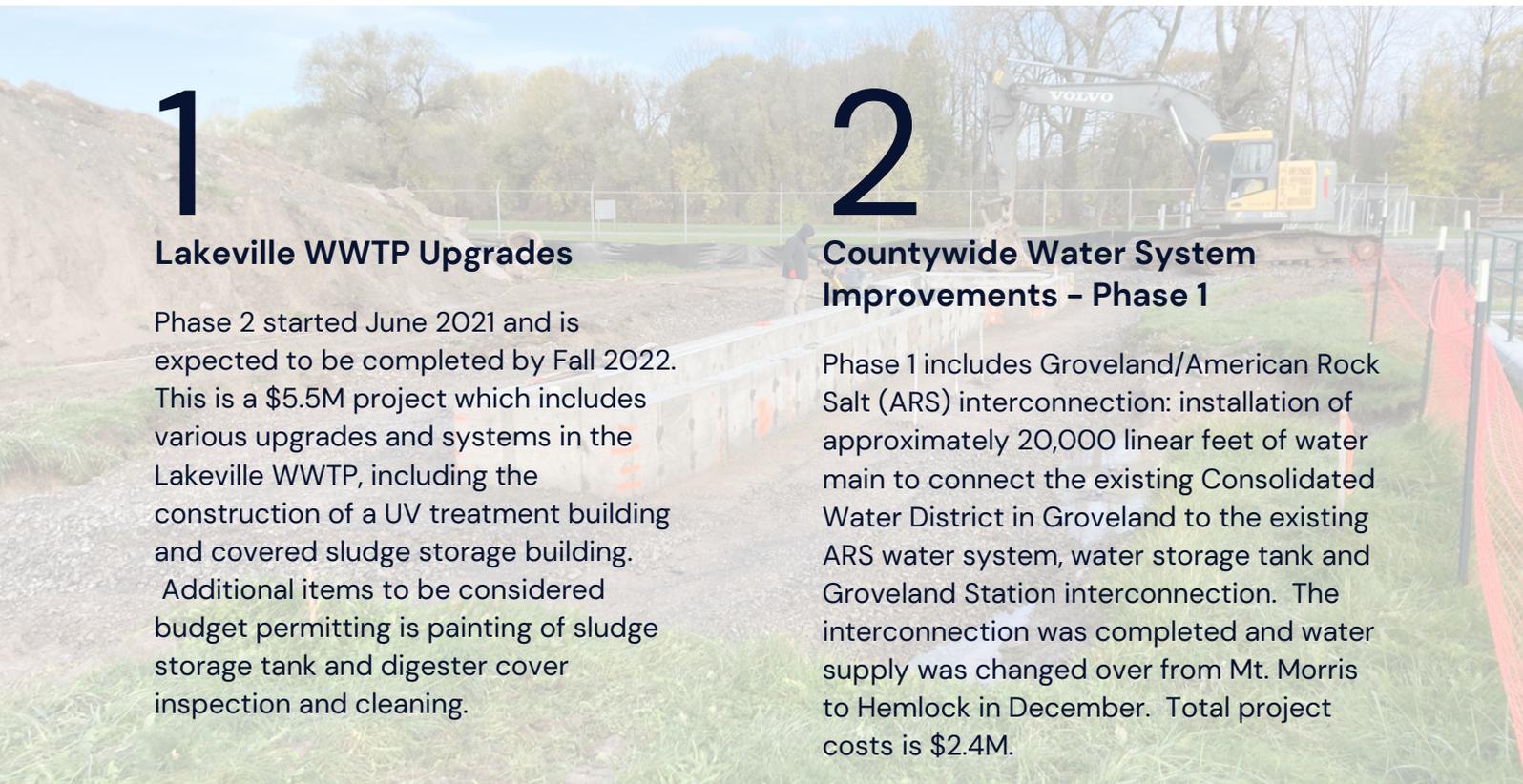
Water Service Area

Lakeville WWTP Upgrades

Phase 2 started June 2021 and is expected to be completed by Fall 2022. This is a \$5.5M project which includes various upgrades and systems in the Lakeville WWTP, including the construction of a UV treatment building and covered sludge storage building. Additional items to be considered budget permitting is painting of sludge storage tank and digester cover inspection and cleaning.

2

Countywide Water System Improvements - Phase 1

Phase 1 includes Groveland/American Rock Salt (ARS) interconnection: installation of approximately 20,000 linear feet of water main to connect the existing Consolidated Water District in Groveland to the existing ARS water system, water storage tank and Groveland Station interconnection. The interconnection was completed and water supply was changed over from Mt. Morris to Hemlock in December. Total project costs is \$2.4M.

DOCCS Water Supply Infrastructure

In January 2019 the Authority put into service a new water system, delivering the Groveland Correctional and Livingston Correctional Facilities with up to a maximum daily flow of 700,000 gallons. In May 2019 DOCCS announced the closing of Livingston Correctional. In November 2019 Groveland Correctional was receiving approximately 40% of its water demand from LCWSA. In June 2021 DOCCS fully decommissioned its water plant and fully transitioned over to LCWSA for water supply. Average daily consumption is between 110,000-125,000 gallons.

4

Pump Station Heating & Ventilation Improvements

LCWSA conducted a Pump Station Energy Efficiency evaluation in which all Authority pump stations were evaluated for improvements that could be made to decrease energy expenditures. The evaluation identified 25 pump stations that could be improved to decrease electric and natural gas costs. In December 2021 the Authority retained a qualified contractor to install heaters and related equipment. Total project costs are \$63,700. The project is expected to be completed by March 2022.

2021 Capital Projects

Inflow & Infiltration (I/I) Study – Phase 1

As a result of NYS DEC Consent Order RB-20180803-83, the Authority applied for and received a \$100,000 grant from NYS EFC Engineering Planning Grant Program for an I/I evaluation. The project included smoke testing and sewer line cleaning and televising in the Hemlock area. Total project cost is \$215,000. The engineering report has been submitted to EFC for grant close out.

Inflow & Infiltration (I/I) Study – Phase 2

As a continuation of the Phase 1 I/I Study, the Authority applied and was awarded \$100,000 funding for smoke testing and sewer line cleaning and televising in the Livonia Center, Village of Livonia and Lakeville areas. Total project cost is \$120,000. Smoking testing will be bid in the Spring 2022 and the project is expected to be completed in Fall 2022.

Conesus Lake Pump Station Evaluation

As part of continuing capital planning effort the Authority, in partnership with its engineers, did an evaluation of the 26 pump stations surrounding Conesus Lake, which were installed in 1968. The evaluation identified the need to replace pumps and controls at each pump station as well as upgrade SCADA communications. The Authority submitted a \$5 million grant request Water Infrastructure Improvement Act (WIIA) program in September. Awards are expected to be announced in the first half of 2022.

2022 Major Projects

1 County Wide Water Supply Expansion

The Authority will be managing next efforts in Livingston County to increase access to water in the central and western parts of Livingston County. Next steps will include identifying preferred alternatives for water supply and distribution along with environmental reviews and funding applications. *Success: Assist County in developing and implementing scope of work and strategy for water expansion (June 2022). Execute strategy include making best use of existing funding sources as well as seeking needed funding for advancement (December 2023).*

2 Countywide Leak Detection Survey & Repairs

The Authority will be partnering with Livingston County to utilize grant funds to complete a county-wide leak detection survey. The leak detection survey will include all municipal water systems in the County including Authority systems. *Success: Completion of the leak detection survey and report identifying severity of leaks and prioritization of repairs (July 2022). Make necessary repairs to limit water loss (December 2022).*

3 Countywide Water System Improvements – Phase 2-4

Phases 2-4 include Countywide improvements of disinfection system upgrades, THM tank removal systems, SCADA systems upgrades and improvements, installation of new water meters for Authority customers throughout the consolidated water district, various distribution improvements and a new water storage tank. Total project cost, including Phase 1, is estimated at \$8.5M. *Success: Completion of project on-time and within budget, including additionally added work (December 2023).*

4 Lakeville Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrades – Phase 2

Phase 2 started June 2021 and is expected to end summer/fall 2022. This is a \$5.5M project which includes upgrades to the Lakeville WWTP, including the construction of a UV treatment building and covered sludge storage building. *Success: Completion of project on-time and within budget. Additional items to consider are painting of sludge storage tank and digester cover inspection (September 2022).*

5 Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) System Wide Improvements – Phase 1

This project includes standardizing and designing the Authority SCADA system and bidding the initial phase of implementation. Cost of this first phase is \$1M. *Success: SCADA analysis and report completed outlining design, build out and schedule (July 2022), bid and award Phase 1 of SCADA improvements (December 2022).*

2022 Major Projects

Groveland Station Wastewater Treatment Facility Assessment

The Groveland Station WWTF is in need of an assessment to outline needed capital improvements. This assessment will provide a priority list and cost estimates of capital improvements and maintenance items for future budgeting purposes. *Success: Completion of Groveland Station WWTF assessment and incorporate recommendations into capital program (June 2022).*

Water and Sewer Rate Study & Analysis

The Authority has grown over the past 20 years and is expected to grow significantly over the next 10 years. The current rate structure has been put together as new customers or municipal water systems are transferred to the Authority with little coordination with the larger water and sewer systems. Reviewing the existing rate structure which will include unit charge definitions, cost of service analysis and debt charges will assist in developing a comprehensive rate schedule. *Success: Completion of rate study analysis and recommendation for rate changes as part of 2023 proposed budget (June/July 2022).*

Avon Wastewater Treatment Plant Capacity Assessment

There have been continuing economic development interests that require additional sewer capacity at the Avon WWTP's. These economic development interests also impact sewer conveyance investments based on sewer capacity availability. An updated assessment of the Avon WWTP is needed to understand cost options related to changing the plants SPDES permit to accommodate future growth. This project involves the intermunicipal cooperation of the Livingston County IDA, Village of Avon, Town of Avon and LCWSA. *Success: Completion of the assessment and develop strategy to apply for funding (June 2022).*

Groveland Wastewater Treatment Facility Disinfection Project

The Authority was awarded \$367,576 through the DEC QWIP (Quality Water Improvement Program) to install ultraviolet effluent disinfection at the Groveland Station Wastewater Treatment Facility. This project will improve water quality by reducing pathogens in the treatment plant's discharge. *Success: Design, bid and build project. Design (May 2022), Construction starts (May 2023) and Operational (May 2024).*

2021 Activities & Accomplishments

Water & Sewer

- Staff serviced 967 customer work orders.
- Staff completed 1,382 utility stakeout requests.
- Repaired five sewer laterals, eight water services, and responded to five water main breaks.
- Completed seven cap-off permits that resulted in a decrease in service units. The cap-off permit is issued to customers who were demolishing or removing a served house or business.
- Completed 12 new water taps.
- Activated 25 new accounts this year. These are accounts that either had a new water and/or sewer connection to the LCWSA system.
- NYS Department of Environmental Conservation completed its annual inspections of both the Lakeville Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Groveland Station Sewage Treatment plant and found these facilities to be in satisfactory condition.

Sewer

- Took over wastewater treatment plant operations from private contractor. Hired Senior WWTP Operator and WWTP Operator Trainee.
- Completed annual maintenance on generators and boilers at our water stations and wastewater facilities.
- Calibrated all flowmeters.
- A sewer vac truck was rented and all wet wells at each pump station were cleaned.
- Staff completed sewer cleaning and televising for Livonia Center and several sewer mains in other districts.
- Staff repaired 8 manholes and rings.
- Continued maintenance and repairs were conducted on pump stations across the water and sewer systems
- In December LCWSA was awarded \$367,576 to install ultraviolet effluent disinfection at the Groveland Station Wastewater Treatment Facility and \$198,055 to add year-round phosphorus removal at the Lakeville Wastewater Treatment Facility.

Water

- In July LCWSA entered into a 40-year lease agreement with the Village of Livonia for operation and maintenance of their water system.
- In July LCWSA entered into meter reading and billing agreement with Town of Leicester for the Rt. 36 Water District.
- Replaced one hydrant, repaired/rebuilt four hydrants and repaired four main line valves.
- Replaced 19 curb boxes and rods.
- Replaced 365 water meters.
- Replaced the chlorinator lines at Sliker Hill Rd. and Niver Rd., Scottsburg Tank and the chlorine booster at pumping station 5E.
- Replaced both pumps at the Shelly Rd. pump station.

FINANCIAL REPORTING

The revenues and expenses, and assets and liabilities, as of and for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, are set forth in the audited financial statements prepared for the Authority by Bonadio & Co., LLP. The statement of net position and the statement of revenue, expenses, and change in net position provide information about the Authority as a whole and about its activities and are presented on the following pages.

A schedule of the Authority's outstanding debt, as of December 31, 2021 has been included as Appendix A.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS:

NET POSITION

Increased from 2020 by \$1,371,322, resulting in total 2021 net position of \$31,600,168.

OPERATING REVENUE

2021 Operating revenues increased over 2020 by \$290,691, or 8.2%.

OPERATING EXPENDITURES

2021 Operating expenditures increased over 2020 by \$71,321, or 1.6%.

IMPACTING FACTORS

Increased revenue due to DOCCS transitioning to 100% LCWSA water supply.

Management's Assessment of Internal Controls

The Authority has developed policies and procedures to provide reasonable assurance that assets are safeguarded from unauthorized acquisitions, use of, or disposition of assets that could have a material effect on the Authority's operations, financial statements and reports, and that the records of the Authority reflect only authorized transactions.

The Authority's system of internal controls is evaluated regularly by Authority management and administrative staff. Independent external auditors also review the internal control system of the Authority in order to determine compliance with generally accepted accounting principles and safeguards for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

Public Authorities Law requires all public authorities to complete an annual assessment of the effectiveness of their internal control structure and procedures.

This statement certifies that the Livingston County Water & Sewer Authority followed a process that assessed and documented the adequacy of its internal control structure and policies for the year ending December 31, 2021. To the extent that deficiencies were identified, the Authority has developed corrective action plans to reduce any corresponding risk.
